Our caravan trip for a holiday with family in Canberra began after the Christmas Day service at Bribie, but came to a juddering halt on the Ipswich Motorway, just near Amberley, when debris on the road caused us to lose two tyres on the caravan - one shredded and another punctured. We only carry one spare (to be changed for the next trip!), so we called RACQ and because of the length of the van they had to send a long lowbed from North Lakes (!), and by the evening of 25th we were safely parked at the truck stop at Flinders View. I fixed the punctured tyre and we put the spare on the shredded one and then that massive storm came sweeping through lpswich on its way to Gold Coast!



So we hitched up and crawled through the downpour just over the road to a church carpark where we weathered the storm in the lee of the church building. How's that for the start of the holiday?!

We had to wait at a nearby caravan park on 26th and then got new tyres for the van at Ozzy Tyres Ipswich, who had the tyres there from Brisbane by 10.30 and we were on the road again by 12! Awesome service.

Well we got things back on track after that and after heading up a beautiful Cunninghams Gap, we wandered down the New England Highway through Warwick, Stanthorpe, Tenterfield, stopping to visit Captain Thunderbolts Cave and the WW2 tanktraps, the Saddler Museum, and the Pyramid in a Paddock at Ballandean.



Why would you put a pyramid in your paddock the farmer was asked? Because I had 7,500 kg of spare rock and it seemed like a good idea!

The thing with towing a caravan is you always have to anticipate how you get out of a place you have turned into. The farm road by the pyramid ended in an old railway bridge - with 3.2m clearance! Not a problem.

After swimming the dogs in the river at Deepwater, we free-camped at Wallangarra Park the first night, then on 28th Glen Innes for smoko and stopped at Tamworth Paceway for the second night. Watched the horses exercise the next morning.

Then got to Dubbo on 29th, and stayed a night at a park in the industrial area, and arrived in Canberra as planned for 30th book-in at Sutton with its fenced dog-friendly sites. Time for the grandkids now!

We had a wonderful time doing all kinds of things with the family - the Egyptian exhibit at the National Museum, go-carts, putt-putt, a visit behind the scenes at Questacon Science Museum, a painting class with our granddaughter, tenpin bowling, and the dinosaur museum. Final outing was all the grandkids at Cockington Green Gardens with its miniature buildings from around the world and manicured gardens.

We set off for home on Sun 21 Jan via the Pacific Highway, stopping the first night at Bulahdelah Bowling Club (and an awesome roast dinner for \$18 at the club!), and then at Alstonville Showgrounds, where I had a blistering Indian Vindaloo curry for dinner.

The dogs travelled so well in the back of the car, and would watch the world whizzing by the window and then settle down again. We were amazed at how many parks are now dog-friendly, and how many people travel with their pets.

How strange to arrive back at Webster St and get used to living in the big space of a house again. On the up side, I didn't lose a towing mirror to a roadtrain this time!


Some of these may be completed by the time the Bulletin goes to print.


